#### **Reflections on the Opening Ceremonies**

Friday night, Frances and I stayed in to watch the opening of the Olympics: almost everything you'd ever want to know about the history of the British Isles which included, how shall we say, a range of characters. It began with about 3 or 4 million people on the stadium floor dressed as peasants (or Monty Python characters. Not sure.) doing what looked like some Celtic version of the Macarena, which was followed by the removal of sod and the emergence of smokestacks, which was followed by a moving moment of silence to remember those lost in the war to end all wars, soon followed by lots of children in radiant hospital beds, then lots of people in spandex (a privilege, not a right) dancing to music of the 70's, 80's and then apparently more recent music which I'm too old to recognize. Included in the cast were the Sex Pistols, Queen Elizabeth and James Bond (in parachutes, of course) Captain Hook, Kevin Branagh, Mr. Bean, Hugh Grant, lots of sheep, lots of adorable childrens' choirs, lots of Mary Poppins, lots of people playing lots of drums, Adele, the Bee Gees, and the guy who invented the world wide web (who is not Al Gore), ending of course with Sir Paul McCartney. When I list them all like this, it may sound snarky, even snide, but for what it's worth, I not only really liked the show, especially the fireworks and the floating gold circles and the computer graphics emanating from each stadium seat. I was impressed with how they pulled it off.

Having said that, allow me some Monday morning quarterbacking (though American football is apparently not an Olympic sport). I think they missed somebody really important. By divine coincidence, today, Monday, July 30, is the feast day of what I consider to be one of the most important people in British history, William Wilberforce, whose ministry had impact on the history of our country as well. He really deserved a few

moments in the opening ceremonies. Here's why I think so:

Born in 1759, educated at Cambridge, Wilberforce became a member of Parliament for Hull, then Yorkshire, forming a close friendship with William Pitt. Under the influence of New Testament reading, he had a conversion experience which led him to a deeper intention to lead a Christian life. He was guided by John Newton, who encouraged him not to become a priest, but to stay in Parliament. Deeply committed to the abolition of the slave trade, he fought for passage of the law doing just that, which passed in the House of Lords in 1807, after a lot of resistance. He continued to work tirelessly for the complete abolition of slavery, effected by the Emancipation Act of 1833. If you have some time this week, watch the movie Amazing Grace, which tells about his life, ministry and witness, and focuses on his connection with John Newton (author of the famous hymn), the slave trader whose conversion to Christianity caused him to quit selling other human beings. Wilberforce showed how to put faith to work in the world. He worked for justice and peace. He didn't give up. He did it because he was a follower of Jesus.

Take some time this week to think about the world in which we live, big and beautiful and broken. Take a minute to think about where you see a need for justice and service and healing. Pray for those in need. For Christ's sake, ask God to equip you to be of service, even if in just a small way. As September approaches, think of how you might want to connect with one of the service opportunities at the church. And next time there's an Opening Ceremony of the Olympics in London, let's try to get William Wilberforce included.


