We're set to begin a new project of putting in a shade garden under the cedar tree the front yard! We're hoping to accomplish two goals. To brighten up that side of the yard and to help bees, hummingbirds and other pollinators. We'll be starting with a 4 X 4 section to get a feel of what will thrive in a difficult space. Why do we want clean air and water?

Here are some thoughts from the Holy Trinity Sunday School.

"It just feels clean and nice and healthy. It helps wildlife."

"To keep me alive. Why would you not want to stay alive?"

and, from our youngest:

"So you don't have to eat bathwater or pond water."

We've been talking about caring for "this fragile earth, our island home," and while the problems facing us seem daunting, we believe that small steps can lead to large change. What if we went inside to get our fast food instead of idling the car? Or went a bit ahead or a bit after the busiest times? It may not be practical all of the time, but when it is we're saving a bit of money and lessening our impact on the earth. What if we found different uses for things before we tossed or recycled them? We thought of a few items and checked to find reuses for them. Judging from the resources out there, there doesn't seem to be much you can't purpose! For example, the bags that come in cereal boxes are usually made of high density polyethylene (HPDE). They can be recycled where ever #2 is allowed. If you can get one more use out of them before recycling, you may save adding plastic to a land fill. Here are a few uses we found:

- 1. Snip off a corner to use as a funnel or icing bag.
- 2. Place on the bottom of garbage containers to catch any leaks, or in your vegetable bin.
- 3. Slip a pie inside for easy storage.
- 4. Use instead of packing material.
- 5. Cover your hand to spread warm rice crispy treats into a pan.

We found that old toys can be turned into lamps, artwork, mobiles, and book ends without searching too hard and I'm going to put twigs in some of our old paint bottles and use them as row markers in the flower garden – they're bright and easy to see. You can take a pretty cup and saucer and make a feeder for birds and squirrels. Fill them with left overs and see what food are most attractive to them.

Each small step adds up and begins to change our thought process. We become more aware of the impact we have or can have and hopefully help heal the earth. After all, who wants to eat bathwater?
