Ramblings from the Deacon Lee...

I like to keep abreast of what Christian clergy and others have been saying outside of the church walls recently about our American culture and the role of churches in our society. Jim Wallis, the founder, president and editor-in-chief of <u>Sojourners</u> is a globally respected writer, preacher, justice advocate, commentator on ethics and public life and has been a teacher of faith and public life courses at Harvard and Georgetown University.

In his new 2019 book, **Christ in Crisis: Why We Need To Reclaim Jesus**, Wallis argues that we are in a cultural and political crisis largely stemming from how the American church has become disconnected from the teachings of Jesus Christ. His book builds on the "Reclaiming Jesus" declaration church leaders wrote in May 2018 to address America's moral crisis ("Reclaiming Jesus: A Confession of Faith in a Time of Crisis" on the Web). Our Presiding Episcopal Bishop Michael Curry is part of the "Reclaiming Jesus Movement" and wrote the Forward to the book and considers it, "A real soul food dinner."

Wallis discusses 8 radical questions central to Jesus's teaching: 1. The Neighbor Question, 2. The Image Question, 3. The Truth Question, 4. The Power Question, 5. The Fear Question, 6. The Caesar Question, 7. The Peacemaker Question and 8. The Discipleship Question. He challenges us to ask these questions and measure whether we are thinking and acting "in Jesus name." His writing convinces us that following Jesus's teachings identified in those 8 questions emboldens and empowers us to act in courage and hope.

How To Be An Antiracist, by Ibram X. Kendi 2019-Founding Director of the Antiracist Research and Policy Center at American University has also written **Stamped From The Beginning: The Definitive History of Racist Ideas in America**- 2016. He dedicated the books <u>To survival</u> and <u>To the lives they say don't matter.</u> Both books reached the New York Times top sellers lists.

Kendi says we know how to be racist and how to pretend to be not racist. His book however is all about knowing how to be antiracist. "The only way to undo racism is to consistently identify and describe it- and then dismantle it." Kendi takes us through many antiracist ideas that deal with power, biology, ethnicity, body, culture, behavior, color, white, black, class, space, gender, sexuality, failure and success.

He defines a racist as one who is supporting a racist policy through their actions or inaction or expresses a racist idea. An antiracist is one who is supporting an antiracist policy through their actions or expressing an antiracist idea. Racism has spread to nearly every part of the body politic, intersecting with all kinds of bigotry, inequalities, victim blaming, exploitation and hate. He says, "The source of racist ideas is not ignorance and hate but self-interest."

Eleven steps that can be taken to eliminate racial inequity in our spaces are identified in the last chapter on Survival. Two of them are, "1. Admit racial inequity is a problem of bad policy, not bad people and 2. Identify racial inequity in all its intersections and manifestations."

When Kendi discovered he had stage 4 metastatic cancer he compared racism to metastatic cancer in his essay that argued the heartbeat of racism is denial. He argues the denial of cancer and racism is suicidal. But the heartbeat of antiracism is confession, so to the heartbeat of recovery from metastatic cancer.

One book review states, "This work helps readers see all forms of racism clearly, understand their poisonous consequences, and work to oppose them in our systems and in ourselves."

Reverend Peter Jarrett-Schell is a writer and priest of Calvary Episcopal Church near the Capitol in Washington, DC. He published **Seeing My Skin: A Story of Wrestling With Whiteness** in 2019. He is a White pastor of a historically Black congregation, the husband of a Black women priest, and the father of a biracial son.

His book is all about him wrestling with the question of Whiteness for the better part of 15 years. Jacob Slichter, a book reviewer said, "Schell recalls a series of haunting encounters with friends, family, and strangers and considers the seductive power and incalculable costs of his Whiteness." The story is, "A riveting, all-too-convincing testimony to the endemic and institutionalized racism in which all White Americans still participate, regardless how pure our motives or whether we notice or not," according to reviewer Alan Venable.

Paul Soupiest, the books cover designer wrote, "In recent years, White institutions, congregations, and individuals have begun to wrestle with their racial legacy, but these reflections often get lost in abstractions: "White Privilege," "White Fragility," and "Structural Racism." By examining how Whiteness has distorted his own his perceptions, relationships, and sense of self, Reverend Schell argues for the personal stake that White people have in dismantling racism and offers some creative possibilities that emerge."

These four books I've read offer exciting and riveting examples of how we can follow "The Way of Jesus." I highly recommend them as examples of what our fellow humans are saying outside of the church walls recently about our American culture and the role of churches and Christians in our society.

In Luke 6 Jesus says, "But I say to you that listen, love your enemies, do good to those that hate you, bless those that curse you, pray for those who abuse you. Do to others as you would have them do to you." Peace!
